

Brahms was born in Hamburg on May 7, 1833. After studying the violin and cello with his father, a double-bass player in the city theater, Brahms mastered the piano and began to compose under the guidance of the German music teacher Eduard Marxsen, whose conservative tastes left a lasting imprint on him. In 1853 Brahms went on a concert tour as accompanist to the Hungarian violinist Eduard Reményi. In the course of the tour he met the Hungarian violinist Joseph Joachim, who introduced him in turn to the German composer Robert Schumann. Schumann was so impressed by Brahms's unpublished compositions that he wrote a wildly enthusiastic magazine article about him. Brahms cherished a deep affection for both Schumann and his wife Clara, a famous pianist. The friendship and encouragement he received from them gave impetus to his work. Brahms was deeply in love with Clara, but even after Schumann's death in 1856, she could only offer friendship. Brahms never married.







Werner Tauber is one of the most famous and most popular musicians in German dance music. Born in Chemnitz in 1934 his entire childhood was characterised by the love of music. At the age of seven he started playing accordion, then piano. He attended the orchestra school in Augustusburg, a boarding school where pupils learned not only their individual instrument, but also played orchestra-, jazz- and dance music. When he was twelve, Werner Tauber got a clarinet for present. In fact he would have preferred a saxophone, but since it was impossible to buy one at that time, the clarinet was a good preparation for it. After the war the political situation made a creative musical development even more difficult. The school was closed and Werner Tauber started playing in the Franz Walder-orchestra, which was prohibited in 1954 because its repertoire included too many American titles. The musicians had to flee to West-Berlin. In 1955 Werner Tauber joined the orchestra Max Greger in Munich. In 1960 he became a member of the Hugo Strasser Dance Orchestra, where he played for more than 30 years and also arranged formation music for almost all German formations. Many of them won the world championships with a Tauber-music. In 1993 he founded his own orchestra, the Werner Tauber Dance Orchestra. He died in January 2001.
